April in Japan is the start of another new year. As many of you would know, the Japanese business and academic

year commences on 1 April. There can be no April Fool for people in Japan – it's a time to make sure all is in order for the working year ahead. This is a busy time for Japanese businesses and organisations, including the many here in Sydney.

Since our last issue I had the great pleasure of attending the reception hosted by Captain Matsuda, Commanding Officer, and Dr Watanabe, leader of the Japan Antarctic Research Expedition, when the icebreaker Shirase docked in Sydney. I was very impressed when I first learn of the history of Shirase and saw how the Shirase sword was described as the 'sword of friendship' by the Australian Museum in Sydney. At the time, I thought that in a sense Lieutenant Shirase was an early ambassador for Japan over a
