Icebreaker Shirase visits Sydney

Carrying the 55th Japanese Antarctic Research Expedition (JARE), the Japanese icebreaker *Shirase* docked at Sydney on her way home to Tokyo.

On Saturday 15 March around 200 guests attended a reception on board the icebreaker *Shirase* at White Bay Cruise Terminal, Rozelle (Sydney). Captain Koji Hidaka, Commanding Officer of the *JS Shirase*, and Dr Hiroshi Miyaoka, Leader of the 55th JARE team, hosted the event which was attended by people involved in Japan-Australia relations.

overwintered with his Antarctic expedition team more than a century ago. The leader of Japan's first Antarctic expedition gave his name to a large glacier in Antarctica which in turn is the origin of the name of the *Shirase* icebreaker.

Since 1957, the icebreaker *Shirase* has been visiting the Antarctic annually taking JARE members and material there and back to Japan. The JARE teams conduct research on biodiversity and environmental

conservation, mainly at the Japanese base called Showa Station. The current *Shirase* 5003 is the fourth generation icebreaker.

The *Shirase* arrived in Sydney on 15 March and departed on 21 March. *Shirase*'s call at Sydney was its final stop on its way back to Tokyo.
