The award ceremony for the 2015 Australia-Japan Relations Essay Contest for NSW and NT Secondary School Students was held on 3 December. The ceremony was attended by prize-winning students, their families, school officials, sponsors and representatives from the NSW Department of Education.

The Consul-General of Japan in Sydney, Mr Masato Takaoka, presented

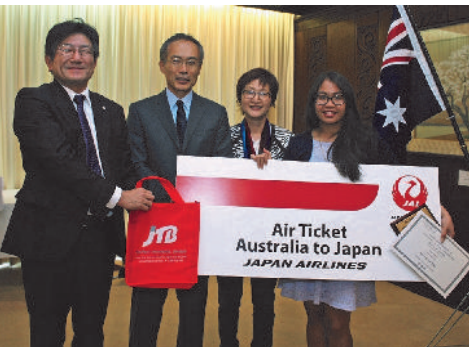
