On a different note, I am always impressed how Japanese people contribute to local community festivals. Last month, I attended the Matsuri–Japan Festival in Willoughby where there is a large Japanese community. Japanese performers will also participate in the upcoming Burwood Festival and Ryde's Granny Smith Festival.

Sydney's major Japanese festival "Matsuri-Japan Festival" will be held at Darling Harbour on 9 December. I encourage you to come along.

NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian visits Japan

NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian paid her first official visit to Japan in her capacity as premier from 20 to 23 August. The focus of her mission was to boost infrastructure investment into New South Wales and strengthen cultural and trade ties. Among her engagements was a meeting with the Governor of Tokyo, Ms Yuriko Koike.

The business focus of the Premier's trip was of course very strong, but her trip also included items which point to the broad ties between Japan and New South Wales. The sharing of know-how was a stand-out.

During their meeting, Premier Berejiklian and Governor Koike discussed the sharing of expertise and experience gained from the Sydney 2000

New South Wales & Tokyo Metropolis have been sisterstates since 1984. There are 38 sistercity relationships between towns and cities in NSW and Japan. Games in the lead-up to Tokyo 2020. In 2015, New South Wales and Tokyo signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on exchange and cooperation in three areas—sports, education and city planning. The last of these has seen staff exchanges between the Tokyo and NSW governments.

Still on the Olympics, the Premier was joined by Australian Olympic Ambassdor, Ian Thorpe, as she toured the Tokyo Tatsumi International Swimming

Center and the Olympic aquatic centre. NSW-based architects, Cox Architecture, are helping to design the aquatic centre.

Ever brighter—

Sydney's Vivid 2018 dates launched in Tokyo

Tourism is important to both Japan and Australia, for their economies and for creating closer ties between the people of both countries. At the global launch of the Vivid 2018 dates, Premier Berejiklian announced a major initiative by Destination NSW to invite the largest ever Japanese travel trade delegation to visit Vivid 2018. Japan is NSW's largest export market and it is Australia's second largest source of direct investment.

Beyond Sydney—Japanese university coming to Newcastle

During her visit to Tokyo, the Premier visited Nihon University to discuss the university's plans to build a campus in Newcastle. The former Newcastle Law Courts will be home to Nihon University's first overseas campus. After restoration, the campus will have classrooms for up to 200 local and international students as well as a library and a 100-bed dormitory.
