National Day Reception

The National Day reception in celebration of the birthday of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan was hosted by the Consul-General of Japan in Sydney, Mr Keizo Takewaka, on 5 December.

Consul-General Takewaka welcomed more than 300 guests to the reception to celebrate His Majesty the Emperor's 84th Birthday. Guests in attendance were from a wide range of fields, representing the breadth of Japan-Australia ties.

After the national anthems were performed by members of the Royal Australian Navy, the Consul-General delivered his welcome remarks, which were followed by a speech by Dr Geoff Lee, Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier for Western Sydney and Multiculturalism. Guests then enjoyed *kagami-biraki* (the ceremonial breaking open of sake barrels), after which the Hon. Tom Bathurst, Chief Justice of NSW, and Mr Takewaka gave the toasts.



Distinguished guests joined the Consul-General to take part in *kagami-biraki*, opening the sake barrels to release the harmony and good fortune thought to be contained in the barrels.

At the reception, sushi, sake and Japanese food were offered, and tourism information was provided by Japanese government organisations and airline companies. A Japanese taiko drumming group also gave a live performance.



Australia-Japan Roundtable

On 6 November, the Australia-Japan Roundtable was held at the residence of Consul-General Keizo Takewaka. The Hon. Gladys Berejiklian MP, Premier of New South Wales, joined as a guest speaker and many Japanese companies participated.
