2018 Australia-Japan Relations Essay Contest for NSW and NT Secondary School Students

AIM OF CONTEST

The aim of the Australia-Japan Relations Essay Contest is to encourage and develop a better understanding of Japan and Australia-Japan relations, amongst secondary school students in New South Wales and the Northern Territory.

The contest is open to students—not only Japanese language students—enrolled in New South Wales and Northern Territory secondary schools, both public and private, including seventh year primary schools in the Northern Territory.

2018 TOPICS

Senior Division (Years 9-12): 1300-1600 words

Japan and Australia have long histories of scientific research and development. Discuss some of the greatest innovations that have originated in Japan and Australia and how the two countries can work together to promote even greater scientific research and development in the future.

Junior Division (Years 7-8): 700-1000 words

Australian and Japanese culture (art, business, etiquette, fashion, social customs, sport etc.) differ in many ways. What aspect of Australian culture do you think should be more widely recognised and how would you promote a better understanding of it in Japan? What aspect of Japanese culture do you think should be more widely recognised and how would you promote a better understanding of it in Australia?

DEADLINE: 22 August 2018

PRIZES.

The first place winner in the Senior Division will receive a return economy class air ticket* to Japan, courtesy of Japan Airlines. In addition, the first place winner will be provided with a 7-day Japan Rail Pass (Ordinary Class) and 3 nights accommodation at Shiba Park Hotel in Tokyo (conditions apply, subject to availability), courtesy of JTB Australia Pty Ltd.

The **first place winner in the Junior Division** will receive \$300 worth of books of the winner's own choice.

Special Northern Territory Prizes: The first place winners in the Senior and Junior Divisions for the Northern Territory will each receive \$100 worth of books of the winners' own choice from Books Kinokuniya.

Other prizes: "Outstanding Essays" in both divisions will receive \$50 worth of goods from Tokyo Mart. Prizes will be awarded in both divisions for "Highly Commended Essays", and each prize winner will be awarded a certificate and plaque.

The **School of the Year award** will be given to the school with the highest percentage of top quality essays, as deemed by the judges. The school will receive \$400 worth of books.
