Since my arrival in May, I have been able to meet with so many people and

I've participated in numerous events. Through this day-to-day work, I have come to appreciate just how well developed and how close the ties are between Australia and Japan. Over the past half century, our relationship has grown from the strong base of our complementary trade relationship into an extremely broad relationship.

I have received many business delegations and have been involved in economic interactions between our two countries.
