summer festival favourites for people to enjoy—water balloon yo-yo fishing and goldfish fishing; festival food staples *okonomi-yaki* (savoury pancakes) and *yakisoba*; calligraphy demonstrations and hands-on; Japanese toys to try; and dressing up in *yukata* (summer cotton kimonos) and *happi*.

The then AJANT president, Ms Sachiko Hirayama, was pleased to see that numbers were up on last year, with an

estimated 250 people attending the event.

Both the Administrator of the Northern Territory Her Honour the Honourable Sally Thomas AM and Chief Minister the Hon. Terry Mills MLA made time to visit during the day.

At a press conference held at the site during the cultural day event, Chief Minister Mills presented the first pictures of a Japanese pearling mother ship wrecked in 1937.

The event was sponsored by the Northern Territory Government, the Darwin Languages Centre and Japan Food Corp.

The Australian-Japanese Association of the Northern Territory Inc was formed in 1989 and is run by volunteers. The Association aims to foster greater understanding between Australian and Japanese people, especially through cultural exchange, and be a channel and means of contact for new arrivals to the Northern Territory.

Thousands of people attended the Japan Expo and Matsuri in Sydney held at Tumbalong Park, Darling Harbour. Rock bands, traditional music, martial arts demonstrations and dancing were part of a full day of performances on the main stage. Around the park were information booths and food stalls, providing information about travelling to Japan and a taste of Japan in Sydney.

The Traditional Japan and Cool Japan corners allowed people to try everything from CG anime workshops to Japanese calligraphy. Many people took the opportunity to dress up—not only was the yukata photo shoot corner popular, people came to the matsuri dressed in their own yukata and others added a Cool Japan edge in their own cosplay get-ups.
