## 52nd AJBCC conference held in Darwin

The Consul-General of Japan in Sydney, Mr Masato Takaoka, attended the 52nd Australia-Japan Joint Business Conference held in Darwin from 12 to 14 October 2014. The theme of the Conference was *Australia and Japan—A New Era in the Relationship*.

The comments revealed that Prime Minister Abe is keen to seek an earlier ratification of the Japan-Australia Economic Partnership Agreement (JAEPA).

While in Darwin, the Consul-General also paid a courtesy call on The Right Worshipful The Lord Mayor of Darwin, Katrina Fong Lim.

A proposal in 1961 by a visiting Japanese trade representative to form a bilateral cooperation committee provided the spark. In August 1962, the Australia-Japan Business Cooperation Committee (AJBCC) was founded. The Japan-Australia Business Cooperation Committee (JABCC) was established in February 1963, with the first joint meeting of the two committees held over 12-13 May 1963.

The Committees have contributed much to the development of the bilateral economic relationship by promoting ties and mutual understanding between our business communities.
