The 21st Biennale of Sydney is now on until 11 June. The theme— Superposition: Equilibrium & Engagement.

Seventy artists are presented across seven locations, including a number of Japanese artists. At the Art Gallery of New South Wales you will find the work of Rika Noguchi. At Cockatoo Island, there are three Japanese artists' work to discover—Ami Inoue, Yanagi Yukinori and Koji Ryui. The latter resides in Sydney and will contribute a site-specific work. At the 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, Akira Takayama's video work documents a participatory event at Sydney Town Hall which recorded Sydney residents performing songs passed down

through their family.

The artistic director of the Biennale is Japanese curator Mami Kataoka, who explained* the selection of the artists: "The artists in the 21st Biennale of Sydney have been chosen to offer a panoramic view of how opposing interpretations can come together in a state of equilibrium. The history of the people of Sydney collectively reflects the history of the world in the 20th century, in particular the movements and migration of people and cultures away from conflict. My hope is that the artworks in this Biennale will serve as a catalyst for thought for all of us."



Ms Mami Kataoka is chief curator of the Mori Art Museum in Tokyo, and among other positions held, she is also a professor at Kyoto University of Art and Design, Graduate School of Art and Design Studies.
