

Shizuoka is the location of Australia's final pool match against Georgia on 11 October 2019. Being autumn, the chances are all the better of seeing the iconic Mount Fuji, a UNESCO World Heritage cultural property. Mount Fuji together with beautiful green tea fields is synonymous with Shizuoka prefecture. Shizuoka's Izu Peninsula is home to some of the best onsen in Japan. Thanks to its mild climate and coastal location there is plenty of delicious food to try, including the famous cherry blossom shrimp (sakura-ebi). The groundwater from Mount Fuji is behind the great taste of the local sakes and Shizuoka's clean water from its many rivers and springs is a key reason it is still a major producer of wasabi which will only grow well in the very best water.
