As excitement builds ahead of Rugby World Cup 2019 and Tokyo 2020, let's take a look at a couple of lesser known competitions that demonstrate the ongoing nature of sports exchange between Japan and Australia—this time swimming and badminton.

Swimming: In May, the 2019 Sydney Open Meet was held at the Olympic Park Aquatic Centre between 10 and 12 May. Members of the Japanese national team were among the international competitors and 20 swimmers from Japan participated. On 11 May, Consul-General Keizo Takewaka visited the venue to support the team as well as to award medals.



Badminton: It is not one of the most high profile sports in Australia and probably only the keenest fans were aware of the Australian Badminton Open 2019 played in Sydney from 4 to 9 June. Japanese players achieved top results in the competition, coming 2nd in the women's singles and men's doubles, and equal 3rd in the mixed and women's doubles, and 1st in the women's doubles. High profile or not, that's a great result!

And a final word goes to rugby: women's rugby union. At the time of writing Newcastle (13 July) and North Sydney (19 July) were getting ready to host the two test matches between the Japanese and Australian national teams.
