

Business between NSW and Japan by sectors 1

Food and Agriculture

- The third major export market for NSW primary industry products, growing by 9% in 2019.
- Major export items are beef (\$402m, 2nd largest), vegetables (\$57m, 2nd largest), sheepmeat(\$51m, 3rd largest), wheat (\$22m, 3rd largest).
- Marubeni, NH Foods (beef), Kirin, Asahi, Suntory (beverages), Nisshin Seifun(Allied Pinnacle, Milling)
- The number of Japanese restaurants in NSW is more than 1,500*, the biggest in Australia.







 - Information Sharing for the redevelopment of the Sydney Fish Market










Sister City Relationships

 - Wheelchair sports (Rugby, soccer, road racing) etc.










[History]

1890 Kanematsu opened its Sydney branch, exporting Australian wool, cattle skins and beef tallow.

1901 The Commonwealth of Australia was established. The Consulate-General of Japan in Sydney opened.

1941 Attack on Pearl Harbour by Japanese forces Australia declared war on Japan

1942 Bombing of Darwin by Japanese forces
Attack on Sydney Harbour by Japanese Navy midget submarines


Attack on Sydney Harbour by Imperial Japanese Navy midget <u>submarines</u>

- ✓ On 31 May 1942, three Imperial Japanese Navy midget submarines attacked HMAS Kuttabul, killing 21 allied sailors, 19 Australian and 2 English.
- √ 4 Japanese submariners were recovered and accorded a funeral by the Royal Australian Navy. Their remains were returned to their family in Japan.



Cowra breakout

- ✓ On 5 August 1944, 1,100 Japanese prisoners of war attempted to escape from a POW camp in Cowra. 234 Japanese POW and 4 Australians were killed.
- ✓ There were around 2,200 Japanese POWs in Australia.
